HAVANA, Dec. 7, 1872.

The principal event of the past week has been the arrival of the Spanish mail steamer Puerto Rico on Thursday, the 5th inst., and the presentation of the historic flag of the artillery corps of the citizen militia of Madrid as a present from the volunteers in Spain to those in Cuba. The occasion has been eagerly seized by the press of the city, volunteers and all classes of patriotic Spaniards as an opportunity to give vent to elequent and stirring declarations of fraternal union, "the symbol of common country," "eternal brotherhood," and all that sort of thing, you know, among the de. fenders of national integrity. The flag is the same which waved on the Trocadero fortress during the Freech invasion in 1823 under the Duke of Angouteme, and has attached to it eleven streamers, each with its appropriate names and dates.

The prime mover of this patriotic manifestation, and also one of the committee charged with the presentation of the flag, has been the captain of the unteer artillery of Havana, Don Mariano de la Forre, well known two years ago as being at the same time a government employé and the principal partner in the Casino Habanero, a fashionable sporting house. The other members of the Presenation Committee were Don Francisco de la Tor riente, formerly a wealthy Cuban planter, but now following his profession of architect in Madrid, where he is also a Deputy Judge, and Don Francisco Paula Timenez, formerly a banker in Car-denas, but now a wealthy capitalist and banker in

THE FETES, FUSS AND FURY.

Immediately upon arrival of the steamer, which ad been for several days anxiously expected, it was welcomed by bands of music on board of tug. bcats and enthusiastic cheers from the crowds of people lining the wharves and sides of the bay. A amittee of the principal volunteer officers of havana hastened on board, where a number of set peeches of welcome were delivered. Business in the public offices and the city generally was suspended and the whole town seemed seized with a patriotic fever. Before noon the wharves and streets were crowded with a numerous con-course of sightseers. All the volunteer battalions of havana were represented. Meeting at the Cooper Institute Last Evening in Aid of the Widows and Orphans of the Fallen-What the Commune Had for Its Aims-Speeches in All Languages.

A meeting of the friends of the Commune was held last evening in the large hall of the Cooper Institute, for the purpose of adopting measures for the relief of the widows and children of the men wbo perished in the struggle against the "men of Versailles." There was an admission charge of twenty-five cents, but the hall was very nearly onethird full, and the enthusiasm was tremendous in its ecstatic vehemence. The platform was tastefully adorned with numerous red flags, bearing strikingly original legends, such as, "The spirit of the Commune expands as the axe descends upon the necks of its martyrs;" "Equal rights, opportu "nities and compensation;" "The unemployed de-mand work of the government:" These were regarded with fixed attention by the audience in the twenty minutes or so of delay that the projectors of the meeting forced them to endure before they would condescend to produce their speakers. Opposing Atlantic Avenue Assessn Application for a writ of certiorari, to review the proceedings taken in improving Atlantic avenue, in the town of New Lots, was made before the Supreme Court, Justice Pratt, yesterday. The ap-plication is based on the ground 'that the property of the owners has been im-properly assessed for the sum of \$47,000 as follows:-\$27,000, the difference between the price demanded by the lowest bidder for the work and the amount paid to the present contractor for the work; the sum of \$14,300, the amount which should have been deducted and paid by the con-tractor on account of failure to do the work ac-cording to the specifications, and also the sum of \$950 for failure to grade the centre of the avenue. It was also contended that the description in the assessment rolls was incorrect, and that the action of the Board of Supervisors in levying assessments without notice was illegal.
