

THE GREAT SURRENDER.

Close of the "Gould-Erie Compromise"—The Transfer of Property—Six Millions on a Coupe—Practically the Titles are Taken.

The closing act, so far as public interest is concerned, in the Gould-Erie compromise and settlement, was reached yesterday by Jay Gould to the Erie Railway Company of bonds, stocks and securities, and the transfer of the titles to certain real estate in this city, including the Grand Opera House and certain contiguous property, consisting of dwellings and lots.

The hour fixed upon for the transfer of the bonds and stocks was eleven o'clock, and the place the office of Samuel L. M. Barlow.

At about half-past eleven o'clock Mr. Sherman, of the firm of Field & Sherman, Mr. Gould's counsel, arrived, and about twelve o'clock Mr. Clark, counsel for Mrs. James Fisk, Jr., reached the scene of the great negotiation.

It was about three o'clock when the counting of the bonds, &c., was concluded, and Jay Gould and Samuel L. M. Barlow, who were present, were seated at the table.

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HELP FOR STRUGGLING CUBA.

The South American Republics Befriending the Insurgents—An Alliance to be Formed Against Spain.

Public feeling in San Salvador, Nov. 25, 1872. Public feeling in San Salvador is lately being gratified over the question of Cuba's independence, and La Tribuna, the official paper, in one of its late issues has some highly important matter on the subject, which goes to confirm the wide-spread rumor that several of the leading republics of South America intend forming an alliance against Spanish sovereignty in the New World, and recognizing in union the belligerency of Cuba.

BOGOTA, Colombia, Sept. 26, 1872. To His Excellency the MINISTER OF FOREIGN AFFAIRS in the Republic of San Salvador:—

For four long years the people of Cuba, after having proclaimed their independence, have been engaged in mortal conflict with their Spanish oppressors. Up to the present moment they have been treated as if they were a conquered territory, and the sanguinary strife will terminate; but, on the contrary, news is constantly received of the horrors of the contest and of the ruin and desolation which prevail on the island.
