A serious accident occurred on the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad near this place this morning The mail train, due here at half-past ,'our o'cloc M., encountered a broken rail on the trestle at the north prong of Town Creek. The engine jumped the obstacle, but two cars, first and se 'Cond lass, were hurled over into the water belc'w. The sleeping car, on which most of the ladic's were, escaped injury. TERRIBLE RESULTS OF THE BROKEN BAIL.

The rail was broken by the two A. M. South bound freight train. Captain Howell, the con-ductor, and Mr. Prentiss, the Southern Express messenger, were slightly wounded, and four col ored men were more or less injured. wounded men are here, unable to be moved. They give the most terrifying descriptions the disaster, and represent the wallings of the wounded in the darkness as fearful. The sleep ing car stopped before it reached the trestle, other wise the slaughter among the lady passengers would have seen frightful, as that car was the only one crowded on the train. Joint Meeting of the Committees of the Depositors and Stockholders at the Metropolitan Bank Yesterday Mora-Metropolitan Data featering Mora-ing-A Compromise Proposed and Ef-fected-Meeting of the Depositors at Teutonia Hail This Morning-The \$20,069 That Was Lost.

Shorthy after tweive M. yesterday the confer-ence committees of the depositors and stockhold-ers of this bank met in private session at Metro-politan Rant. 10 politan Bank, 103 Broadway. The meeting was advertised for eleven o'clock, but for some reason which did not transpire it was after twelve when the session began. Mr. Williams, the President of the Metropolitan Bank, said that it had been rosolved not to allow newspaper ment to the deliber-ations of the conference. The HERALD reporter, however, learned from Mr. Morney that a sort of compromise had been effected by the comm Atees, which would be made known in the an'ernoon.

MEETING OF THE STOCKHOLDEN'S. At half-past three o'clock the stockholders not at the Ashland House, corner of Twenty-four th street and Fourth avenue, to hear the report of the committee. The committee consisted of the following gentlemen:-Messrs. Fraderivk G. Mather, Samuel Willetts, Jamos M. Fuller, James Russell, Charles Guidet, P. S. Haistead and J. E.

Willia Mr. Williams, who was chairman of the siock holders' meeting, said that before hearing: the' n> port of the committee he would wish to have then i listen to a few remarks that Mr. Most had to make on behalf of the directors of the bank.

This gentleman stated that he would nothave what he was going to say misinterpreted, so he would preface his remarks by stating that he wasnos going to tender the resignation of the Board, but-merely to inform the stockholders and depositions of the willingness of these men to do anything that lay in their power to inrther whatever ends-they (he stockholders and depositors) might have in view. The directors would, he said, tender their resignation if such was the will of the meeting, and in any event do all in their power, both ar-officers and individuals, to help them from the

officers and individuals, to help them from the present difficulty. Marshal Sharpe was now called upon to impart any information he had to the stockholders. He staid that he had nothing to communicate further than that the report which was published in the HERALD of the assets of the bank was not only sub-stantially correct, but perfect in all its details. Mr. Williams, the chairman of the conference committee of stockholders, now read the proposi-tion that was offered at the meeting in the mera-ing. This is it:--

ing. This is it:--First-That the present stockholders of the Bull's Hand Bank be requested to transfer their stock in trust is a committee not exceeding five persons, to be appointed for the purpose of the reorganization of the bank. Second-That we recommend the raising of a preferred capital of \$300,00, which capital shall be entitled to sent-annual dividends, when earned by the bank, at the rate of the per cent per annum, and as soon as the earnings of the bank shall be sufficient over and above such ien per cent to pay dividends on both classes of stock; thence-for the evaluation of the proposed preferred capital, say \$150,000 to the depositor. When this proposition, which was drawn up in the morning, was presented, it guve rise to some little debate, but finally it was carried unani-musity.

mously. A motion was then made by Mr. Mather to have the committee called for in the ioregoing resolu-tion appointed by the chair. Mr. Williams embodied his appointments in the following resolution :--

Resolved, That Messrs. T. E. Mather, A. S. Cam-eron, James M. Fuller, P. S. Haistead and Robert Mook be and are hereby appointed a committee ito reorganiza the Bull's Head Bank upon substantially the principle set forth in the resolution calling for said committee; that they have full power to do all or anything for us and on our befull, except that they shall have no power to obligate us personally for the avement of any money for any purpose whatever. To have no power to colligate us personally for the payment of any money for any purpose whatever. To ald them in the proposed reorganization we hereby agree to transfer to them, to hold in trust for us, the whole amount of our capital stock, the same to be returned by them to us as soon as said reorganization shall be per-jected, and in any event to return it within two years after April 1, 1873.

This motion was carried. Mr. Mather had pro-posed that Mr. Williams should be on the commit-tee, but as that gentleman refused point blank, the amendment was withdrawn and the original rese-lution carried. Messrs. The question as to whether under the existing laws General Sherman could be Acting Secretary of War or Secretary pro tem. during the absence of Secretary Belknap, who leaves to-morrow on an inspection, in company with General Sheridan, of the military posts of the Department of the Missouri, having arisen, the matter was submitted to Attorney Gene-ral Williams for decision, and he decides that under an act of Congress, approved in 1871, no officer of the army can nold any civil position, and that in case he does so he forthwith ceases to be an officer of the army. General Sherman will con. sequently not serve as Secretary of War during the absence of General Belknap, and the President has designated Secretary Robeson to act as Secretary of War during the absence of Secretary Belknap. The jury in the Heggi case, of which a full report will be found elsewhere, agreed on a verdict at half-past twelve this morning. When the Recorder left the court room in the

evening he had said that if the jury agreed on a verdict by ten o'clock he should be called down. otherwise not. At about half-past ten the jury announced that they had agreed upon a ver-dict. The court officers decided to send for the Recorder, and accordingly a messenger was des patched to his residence in Park avenue. In the meantime the deputy sheriffs went to the Tombs and aronsed Heggi and brought him once more to the Court.
