# The Attempted Murder in Oak Street. .

Captain Murphy, hearing that Kurtiand had two sisters hiving on Rodney street. When the Captain came to the house he climbed up a tree, and looking into the window of the house, saw a young man, the brother of the prisoner, sitting in a room. When he returned to the city he ascertained that Kurt-land had boarded in a honse on the corner of Six-ty-eighth street and Second avenue. The Captain took a man and went up to the house, where he learned that a man had left but a short time before, carrying a bundle. As Kurt-land was not known along the river front the Captain got alarmed, and thought that the prisoner had given him the slip and got off on one of the canal or river boats. He, however, succeeded in tracing Kurtland to the depot, where he was re-warded by seeing his man sitting, taking with a conductor in a car that was waiting to go out. The prisoner was greatly surprised, but he took his arrest in good part, and, saying "Cap, I know what you want me for," held out his wrists for the hand-curfs, which Captain Murphy produced from his pockets. Last Sabbath was one of the bloodlest that New York has ever seen. . Murder, suicide and felonious assaults followed each other in such quick succession that there was scarcely a precinct in the lower part of the city which had not its tale of crime to unfold. Nearly all the deadly encounters took place between relatives. The laws of nature and affinity were utterly disregarded. A husband imbrued his hand in the life blood of his wife. married man was stricken down by the blow of an axe, wielded by his brother-in-law, and a youth fell to the earth dead from a stab inflicted by his friend. These latest tragedies have produced a widespread sensation, and it is generally felt that notwithstanding all that has been done in the punshment and repression of crime, life is as far from being secure as ever.

He says he acted entirely in self-defence and had not the slightest intention of killing buffy. He has an-nonneed his intention to employ William F. Howe to defend him. The father of Ellen knew something of character of Gillen, and they did nll they could to discourage her from receiving his addresses, but in spite of their precautions, so strong was the influence of Gillen over the deluded girl, that he prevailed upon her to consent to a secret marriage, and the couple were united in October last. The union was a very unhappy one, and Ellen was so shocked when discovered the real character of her hus.

The officer at the same time observed a man crouching on the other side of the street attentively watching the two girls. The officer determined to watch him closely to see what he was after. Soon after the officer's attention was attracted by the cry of a woman in distress, and Gillen was seen running towards the alley way of 37 Crosby street. The officer is mediately arrested him, and awed him what he had done, when Gillen replied. "I your wife was to do the same attinct to the the done."

from the factory and from the part in the brick building which the flying boiler razed to the ground. THE LOSS is estimated at about ten thousand dollars. The company was very busy and about winding up its business for the Summer. Mr. Rogers claims that the boilers and machinery were in percet order and had been thoroughly overhauled last Fall; that then everything was in such excellent order that the inspectors advised him that it was uscleas to insure the same. There was an insurance on the building of \$10,000. Outsiders say, however, that the boilers were old and infirm and that ten pounds of steam could not possibly have done such terrific destruction had they been sale and sound. Mr. Rogers is unable to give the cause of the explosion, and claims that it is something that nobody can flad out. Coroner Seidner has been notified of the death of Tuckerman and will hold an inquest to-day probably. Large crowds of people visited the scene of the explosion yesterday, which furnished a sort of free circus to the ruralites.

#### Monumental Muddle-The Rights of Plot Owners in Cemeteries.

NEWBURG, June 16, 1873.

For some time past a marble cutter named John T. Case, of this city, has been at work upon a handsome monument to be erected in St. Patrick's Cemetery over the graves of a son and two daughters of Mr. Thomas Ryan, a well known citizen. Rev. Edward S. Briady, pastor of St. Patrick's church and director-in-chief of the cemetery, refused, it is said, to grant Mr. Ryan (who is a member of his congregation) a permit to erect the monument before the payment of a fee of \$10 was made. The fee was thought fee of \$10 was made. The fee was thought to be too large and was not paid by Mr. Ryan, though it is understood a less amount was offered. The gates were fastened by direction of Father Brindy, and he awaited further developments. To-day Mr. Ryan, with the markie cutter and his men, effected an entrance into the cemetery, and pro-ceeded to lay the foundation for the monument. Father Briady, on hearing of this action, went to Justice Henry C. Milispaugh, and procured a warrant for the arrest of Kyan and Case, charging in his complaint that they "did wil-fully malicionsity and unhavinily break the gate er lock of the entrance to St. Patrick's Cemetery, in the city of Newburg, on the leith day of June, 1873." The warrant was placed in the hands of the City Marshal, and served this atternoon. Ryan and Case promptly gave ball to await the action of the Grand Jury. They propose, however, to commence proceedings to-morrow to procure an injunction against Father Briady and test his right to close the cemetery against them.
