Dana (Cheers) and Henry Ward Beecher (Cheers) were among the speakers; and it fell to his (Mr. Sullivan's) lot to say that the time was coming for them, as American citizens, to speak out. He said then that every day and every hour that the United States postponed the recognition of the beligerent rights of the Cubans would bring about great trouble and difficulty, and would result in
