The next day I received a letter in Spanish from the commanding officer of the Bazan, a copy of which is herewith enclowed, as well as the correspondence resulting thereirom, and a let-ter from the United States Consul on' the subject, which I have not had the opportunity of answer-ing, and shall not before the Pacific mail steamer (leaves for New York; but I shall give the protec-tion requested, and for that purpose I will be obliged to remain here till the Virginius is ready to sail or until the arrival of another United States vessel, which, I am informed by the Consul, he has received notice of being ordered here; then I shall proceed to carry out the department order of the bit inst. The Bazan is an iron hull, schooner rigged gunboat, carrying two pivot guns, and ap-parently quite fast. She was built in England, and resembles, at a short distance, the vessels built in New York for the Spanish government, but she appears rather larger.
